Introduction

Our Connecticut school communities — with students at the center — continue to be bold and innovative as they respond to the COVID-19 pandemic. The United States Department of Education (USED) has recognized the importance of supporting these efforts, particularly with the infusion of resources to support education in Connecticut. The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund (ARP ES-SER) has granted the State of Connecticut an additional \$1,105,919,874, providing the opportunity to develop bold, high-impact plans to address the substantial disruptions to student learning, interpersonal interactions, and social-emotional well-being. While earlier sources of federal relief funding during the pandemic supported our ability to first survive, and then thrive, ARP ESSER is Connecticut's opportunity to transform our schools.

The federal government requires that each Local Education Agency (LEA) create a Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Services Plan (the Plan). This plan must be publicly available online by June 23, 2021 and submitted to the Connecticut State Department of Education (CSDE) as a part of the ARP ESSER application due mid-August 2021. To aid in the planning process, CSDE is providing this template to guide LEAs planning as well as serve as an opportunity to share the Plan with the public.

Due to the expansive efforts of the CSDE and the educational community, as of the week of May 3–7, 2021 no district in the state of Connecticut was fully remote. This was achieved through extensive planning by each LEA; therefore, this template should be seen as a means to support LEAs' efforts to date and can be used to expand upon or revisit pervious Reopening School Plans.

The CSDE has maintained consistently that in-person learning is the preferred opportunity for students and that schools should work to safely open their buildings for the 2020–21 school year. We are proud to have led the nation in safe return to in-person instruction —as of April 30, 2021 nearly 82.7% of Connecticut school districts were offering a predominately fully in-person learning. Thank you for your work and helping us continue to be an example of how we can best serve our children safely in school buildings.

The Waterford Public Schools returned to five days a week full in-person learning PK-12 on April 19, 2021 and continued with full in-person learning for the entire 2021-2022 school year. We will continue to operate with full inperson learning for the 2022-2023 school year. We will adopt, adapt, and modify policies, protocol, and procedures, as well as best practices in mitigation strategies based on recommendations, guidance, and requirements as articulated by the CDC, CT DPH, CSDE, Governor's Executive Orders, our local health district and our district medical advisor. We will utilize the appropriate mitigation strategies to maintain a safe learning environment for all.

✓	Universal and correct wearing of masks	The Waterford Public Schools will follow the guidance, recommendation, and requirements of the CDC, CT DPH, CSDE, Governor's Executive Orders, our local health district and our district medical advisor in regards to mask-wearing in schools.
		Exceptions based on documented medical information will be considered in accordance with State of CT guidelines and after consultation with our medical advisor.
		As of February 28, 2022, masks have been recommended but not required inside school buildings. Even with this shift, masks have been and will still be required in certain settings such as school health rooms.
		Should there be an outbreak in a classroom, a grade level or team, one of our schools, or in the district, we will consult local and state health authorities in making any needed adjustments to our protocols, which could include temporary mandated mask-wearing. The school district will continue to publish weekly COVID numbers on Friday afternoons on the district COVID Dashboard.
		Parents who wish for their children to continue to wear masks or may wish them to return to mask wearing for any time period in the future, should communicate clearly to their children their expectations for mask-wearing. Teachers and administrators will not be responsible for monitoring student mask compliance. These individual decisions will be fully supported by school administration and staff, and students will be reminded to respect and not judge their peers and their decisions to wear a mask or not.
		The CDC, CT DPH, LLHD, and the American Academy of Pediatricians (AAP) all recommend/strongly encourage universal masking in schools.
		The District will follow CT DPH, CSDE and CIAC guidance in regards to masking for athletics.

Mitigation strategy LEA response Comprehensive contact tracing is no longer recommended by the CT DPH and is not being conducted on individual cases. While individual contact tracing is no longer occurring, students, staff, Contact tracing in combination with isolation and families may be notified of outbreaks occurring



and quarantine, in collaboration with the State, local, territorial, or Tribal health departments

within their classroom, grade, or school level depending on the extent of transmission and structure of the school. The district will follow DPH guidance to refer to the CDC COVID-19 Community Levels to determine when to consider enhanced measures for the prevention of respiratory viral diseases. The school district will continue to publish COVID numbers on the district COVID Dashboard.

Our administrators and school nurses are trained and well-versed in our protocols which align to the guidance, recommendation, and requirements of the CDC, CT DPH, CSDE, Governor's Executive Orders, our local health district and our district medical advisor.

We will follow DPH guidance regarding students, teachers, and staff who have symptoms of COVID-19. Students, teachers and staff who experience mild respiratory symptoms (infrequent cough, congestion, runny nose, sore throat, etc.), no fever, and no known COVID-19 case in their household should self-test at home for COVID-19 prior to leaving for school and can be allowed to attend in-person if their test result is negative. In this case students and staff are strongly encouraged to wear a mask indoors.

Students, teachers and staff who have a fever (≥100°F) should stay home and test for COVID-19. Anyone with a fever should not report to school until they are fever free for 24 hours without the use of medication.

For students, teachers and staff who test positive for COVID-19, we will follow current guidance on Isolation & Quarantine according to the CDC Q/I Calculator, which stipulates continuing with 5 days of isolation.

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		Diagnostic screening and testing	The Waterford Public Schools will not offer diagnostic screening or testing for students or staff at this time. Any testing program implemented during the year in any WPS buildings will require parental consent. The district has received at-home test kits which are available for symptomatic staff and students; students and staff with a known direct exposure; and for staff and students where an outbreak may be occurring. The district will continue to make parents and families aware of testing options in the community.
	✓	Efforts to provide vaccinations to educators, other staff, and students, if eligible	The Waterford Public Schools will continue to publicize opportunities for vaccinations for staff and students in collaboration with our local health district and other partner agencies. We were able to offer an on-site vaccination clinic in the 2021-2022 school year in partnership with our UCFS School-Based Health Centers and will look to do so again in 2022-2023 if available. We will adhere to all federal and state laws regarding vaccinations for students and staff. The district will continue to make parents and families aware of vaccination options in the community.
		Appropriate accommodations for children with disabilities with respect to the health and safety policies	Our reopening plan applies to all students in the Waterford Public Schools. We will adhere to any guidance, recommendation, and requirements of the CDC, CT DPH, CSDE, Governor's Executive Orders, our local health district and our district medical advisor as it pertains to appropriate accommodations for children with disabilities. We will follow all state and federal laws, including but not limited to IDEA and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation act.

II. Continuity of Services

Waterford Public Schools will continue with our goal of 100% in-person learning for the entire 2022-2023 school year.

We followed the guidance, recommendation, and requirements of the CDC, CT DPH, CSDE, Governor's Executive Orders, our local health district and our district medical advisor when making decisions on continuity of services in the 2021-2022 school year. All students, PK-12, returned to full in-person learning by April 19, 2021. Our priority and plans for the 2022-2023 school year include full in-person learning five days per week for all Waterford students. Through summer programming, wrap around instruction, additional acceleration and intervention services, additional SEL and mental/behavioral health supports, we will ensure high-quality access for all students. We will continue many of our services and practices from this school year moving forward to support the social, emotional, mental, physical, and academic needs of our students.

Visitor access to school buildings may remain limited during the course of the year due to varying public health conditions. We will continue to utilize drop boxes outside all schools.

Visitors, volunteers, and external groups or organizations who wish to access school facilities during the school day must comply with all district health and safety policies at all times, regardless of vaccination status.

III. Public Comment

The Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Services Plan for 2022-2023 is in strict alignment with our Reopening Plan for the 2020-2021 school year. Wide public input and comment has been consistently gathered since July of 2020 including but not limited to: a dedicated reopening@waterfordschools.org email address; a dedicated web page to reopening; publication of the COVID Liaison with contact information; online forums and webinars; as well as the continued opportunity for submission of public comment at Board of Education meetings. This plan is not new content, but rather a continuation of our existing plan, hence wide public comment and input has already been gathered.

With that said, specific to this plan, the Waterford Public Schools will publicly post this plan on our website and notify all families via our mass notification system. We will utilize our existing reopening@waterfordschools.org email address to gather and consider public comment in the regular reviews of our plan.

IV. Periodic Review Process
